





**Preliminary Assessment Report**

The preliminary assessment for the juvenile A. Dinakaran (Aged 17 years 4 months 30 days, S/O Arumugam residing at 33, Sengol Nagar, 3<sup>rd</sup> street, Old Vilangudi, Madurai 625018) was conducted as per the request sent.

The said juvenile appears to be of his age, well groomed, with good orientation to date, time and place. He showed good eye contact during the assessment interview with good amount of emotional balance.

The cognitive domain of functioning was assessed using mini-mental status examination (MMSE). His obtained score is 30 (maximum score 30), which shows that he possesses good cognitive functioning skills.

His psychosocial maturity was assessed with appropriate tools. He scored 33/44. This high score and good cognitive functioning indicates that he possesses adult level of maturity and the juvenile offender with this score range (33-44) may be transferred to adult jurisdiction based on the severity of crime committed.

Preliminary Assessment Report

As per the referral the preliminary assessment was conducted for C. Saravana Kumar (Aged 17 years 5 months, S/o Chandrasekar). The juvenile appeared to be of his age and well dressed. His general behaviour and manners are also appropriate of his age.

The cognitive functioning was assessed using mini-mental status examination (MMSE) and found to be having no cognitive impairment (obtained score 24, maximum score 30).

His psychosocial maturity was assessed with appropriate tool and the juvenile scored 30/44. It was found that he lacks perspective and temperance. He is more vulnerable to peer pressure.

Based on the assessment scores, the referred juvenile is possessing sufficient amount of cognitive ability and good psychosocial maturity. However, he may not be transferred to adult jurisdiction (the required psychosocial maturity score to transfer the juvenile offender to adult jurisdiction is 33/44).






